At the last Working Bee one of our members Peter Lang pointed out a nearby Australian Admiral butterfly. This striking butterfly with its richly coloured chestnut and cream markings was a delight to see. It breeds in the Arboretum where the larvae live on stinging nettles. After they emerge as adult butterflies they fly up the hills face where they "hilltop" congregating around the tops of hills. This probably explains why we were able to enjoy the sight of this beautiful butterfly near the top of Quartz hill.

The late spring rains and sunshine have really freshened up the Waite Conservation Reserve and there is still time to see some of the flowers at their colourful best. A good way to do this is to come along on the final two working bees (November 20<sup>th</sup> and Dec 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting 9-00 am at Garrett's gate). On these dates Stephen and Grant who are coordinating the Working Bees will also have a propagation session for those interested in growing local plants from our own seed. As always there will be olives and other assorted weeds to remove.
